My original plan for spring break was to take our students to an outreach/mission event called Beach Reach. Beach Reach is an awesome mission event that takes place at South Padre Island, Texas. It's a week of outreach during spring break. Although this would be a fun and exciting trip, and our students would surely be challenged and grow spiritually, it simply didn't feel right to go to something like this considering what we have been teach-

ing our students. Going on a mission trip halfway across the country felt counterintuitive to teaching our students to share the gospel and serve God now, where they are at, in their daily lives. My solution was to go to somewhere closer, like Independence Missouri, and engage in apologetics with the Mormon population there, but this too felt superficial – It felt like I was trying to plan a mission trip because that's what the BSU has often done, but it didn't feel right to me based on our teaching focus.

This spring break, I have felt compelled to engage in a mission trip right here in Neosho and the surrounding area. I am developing a "spring break challenge" for our students that will turn their spring break into a local mission event. To put it simply, I am developing a checklist of Kingdom building things to accomplish during spring break, right here in Neosho and the surrounding area. Some things that will be included in this challenge are, "Share the gospel with 5 strangers," "Pray with 5 people," "Share the gospel with a close friend or family member," "Encourage someone in the Lord every day this week," "Do a service project for someone." We will take our students to surrounding locations, like the mall in Joplin and Rogers, and stores in Neosho, to give them opportunities to complete these challenges.

If you or your church is in need of workers for a project (simple construction, painting, yard work, etc.), is engaging in outreach during spring break, needs volunteers for an event during spring break, please let me know before spring break. Serving in these ways will be a part of the challenge for our students during spring break.




